Risk for neural tube defects (NTDs) can be significantly reduced by adequate intake of dietary folate and folic acid (its more bioavailable synthetic form). However, risk reduction is possible only if the intervention takes place before and in the very earliest days of pregnancy. Nurse practitioners in women's health are uniquely well positioned to provide pre-conception counseling on this important point to all reproductive-aged women, whether or not they are actively planning a pregnancy. This symposium will review strategies to reduce risk for NTDs and discuss when, why, and how to provide appropriate patient counseling.

**Exploring the Benefits of Nondaily
Hormonal Contraception** 1.5 Rx

Despite the number of convenient and effective options available, contraception is underutilized and misused in the U.S. as evidenced by the approximately 3.1 million unintended pregnancies occurring yearly. Several forms of nondaily hormonal contraception offer convenience, efficacy, and ease of use, along with several noncontraceptive benefits. In this symposium, participants will receive the knowledge and guidance they require to provide their patients with comprehensive contraceptive counseling and to select the methods of nondaily hormonal contraception that are appropriate to their patients' needs.

A review of epidemiology, pathophysiology, clinical differentiation, and therapeutic options for treatment of IBS and chronic constipation will be covered.
